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ADVICES AND QUERIES FOR FIRST MONTH: MEETING FOR WORSHIP

The heart of the Religious Society of Friends is the Meeting for Worship. In direct communion with God, we offer ourselves for God's will. Our daily lives are linked with the Meeting for Worship, the Meeting for Worship with our daily lives.

Come regularly to Meeting for Worship, even when you are angry, tired, or spiritually cold. Bring your joys and your hurts, and the needs of other people. Accept and support each other in the community where God dwells among us. As you do so, you may find the grace of prayer.

At times the Spirit may prompt you to speak in Meeting. Wait patiently to know that the sense and the time are right. When you are sure, have *confidence* that the words will be given to you. Listen to the ministry of others with an open spirit. If it is not God's word for you, it may be for others. After a message has been given, allow time to ponder its meaning and to let the Meeting return to silent worship. In speech and in silence, each person contributes to the Meeting.

- Do I come to Meeting with heart and mind prepared for worship?
- In both silent and vocal ministry, do I respond to the leadings of the Holy Spirit, without pre-arrangement and in simplicity and truth?
- Am I careful not to speak at undue length or beyond personal spiritual experience?
- *Do we meet in expectant waiting for the promptings of the Divine Spirit?* ¹
- *Are we drawn together in a living silence by the power of God in our midst?*

Structure of the two series: Many people, but not all, expressed a desire to have advanced reading, so most presenters will provide materials or recommended reading in advance. We will start promptly with worship, include a presentation of history and ideas related to the topic, and include discussion (in small groups depending on our numbers). We plan to

close on time with worship.

SPIRITUAL FORMATION GROUP Wednesday Spiritual Formation Study Group. Meets alternate weeks (approximately) at the Meetinghouse in the library at 7:30 PM. We take seriously God's call in our lives, are open to Christian spiritual transformation, and desire to live out our Quaker values in our daily lives. We will explore Christian devotional works about spiritual experience, scripture, prayer, community, Quakerism, and/ or ministry. We hope to deepen our faith and support each others' journeys. Advices & queries: Clerk, George Mills, read advices and queries on meeting community. There were no responses perhaps because the concern for our community was evident in the meeting for worship earlier in the day.

Minute #1 **Review of agenda:** No changes were offered to the posted agenda.

The minutes from Eleventh month were approved as published.

Clerk's report

Ben Lomond Quaker Center is planning a visioning session June 3--5, 2011. We are asked to send "representatives." Bob and Kathy Runyan have accepted the directorship of Quaker Center beginning next year.

The clerk reported on several items of correspondence, thanks and appeals, Earlham College offers a "discern-O-matic" quiz on the web for teen Quakers.

The clerk announced that Palo Alto's spring retreat has been scheduled for Saturday March 26, 2011 at Hidden Villa. The theme is to be determined—contact Talley Kenyon with suggestions.

Worship sharing: The clerk noted how busy our lives tend to be and how difficult it has been to fill nomination committee's slate. What draws you to service? What feeds you when serving? what drains you?

- We face challenges balancing all we want to do. In this we are not unique. Our workplaces are demanding greater "productivity" the cost of which is borne by the voluntary organizations.
- Do we have too many committees?
- Maternal genes predispose me to service. The level of service needs to be more than baking cookies. Weighty Friends do not stand in the way of others' service. When you

become a Friend you take on a different color though we are still trying to “pass” as normal people, not “peculiar.”. This is hard to do.

- At home we receive a lot of mail. It stacks up. We seldom catch up. With committee work there is no resolution—It doesn’t have endings. Accomplishment is hard to appreciate. Hotel de Zink and Harvest festival are pleasant exceptions.
- When I feel someone’s needs and pain or suffering I can put myself in their shoes. At that moment there is no hesitation to give, to serve,
- A sense of accomplishment feeds me. Quibbling does not feed me; it sends me out the door. As part of our faith we go out into the world. Going out affects the time available for work with meeting. Children come later in life nowadays, so the 40 year olds are still parenting rather than having time to serve.
- What nourishes me is working together with people in the spirit. What drains me is having obligations more than I can meet. We want to fix things at all levels and to look at all that is wrong. To do this we need to be grounded in the spirit. If we want to enlarge our community it will take energy and grounding.
- I’m a Friend because it feeds my soul. Having a community where I are respected and welcomed is nourishing. This allows me to do “do-gooder” things in the rest of the world. I want to help build this community so that other souls may be nourished. We create a welcoming safe place and it includes baking cookies. Demographics change. Our family, work and travel commitments are larger. What drains me is feeling that we need to make choices to stay here.
- We are really meeting the needs of individuals. Oversight committee is a delight because everyone does what they say they will. I’m worried about lunch sign ups for the spring.
- I have a lot of deadlines right now. What drains me is the anxiety about being overwhelmed. I have to remember that it’s my choice. I have to stay in the moment, The journey counts. It’s not what you do but how you do it. What draws me is joy.

Peace and Social Action Committee: Carin Pacifico

Minute #2 Meeting received a letter template from the Fellowship of Reconciliation to send to senators recommending ratification of the START treaty. Finding this in accord with our principles, the committee recommended our participation. In spite of the lack of the actual document, we agreed to send a letter over the clerk’s signature urging the senators to ratify the START treaty. This came from a recommendation from F.O.R. through our Peace and social action committee. Approved. The clerk will circulate the text before sending it off, to give those with misgivings about approving the letter sight unseen a chance to review it and raise any concerns they may have with the substance of it.

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Minute #3 Jennifer presented the 2nd reading of the following nominees: For Hospitality: Kei Befu, Harumi Befu, Marie Simirenko as half slots, Chula as substitute, Mary Lou Moses as assistant; Treasurer (beginning Jan 1): Forest Preston; for Harvest Festival Steering Committee (beginning Jan 1): Robin Sevens and Diana Egly. Attachment #1 A draft minute was presented re representative and liaison positions. We read the minute aloud.

There was a concern as to the lack of individual committee budgets for many of our committees which would have representatives/liasons to fund under this proposal. There was a desire to know which liaisons are attached to which committees. How does having these liaisons attached to committees help us? Original discussion last year was for purpose of reimbursing representatives, not to make committees responsible for this. We will gather some of the information and bring this item forward next month. Mary Klein and Jennifer Summit will accept input.

Hubert Morel-Seytoux served as the finance committee member of the *Ad Hoc* committee on the distribution of support funds to Quaker organizations. He presented a history of our allocations and this year's contribution schedule from the *Ad Hoc* committee for that purpose. We accepted the report.

The Ad Hoc Committee's next task is to develop guidelines to help future committees with this task. To that end, Hubert presented some thoughts of his own on what those guidelines might include. We may need to stretch even further to allocate more funds to Quaker Organizations in these hard economic times.

Peace and Social Action, Unity with Nature, and Community Service also have donation lists. Could they be published, also, to guide Friends in their personal charity giving? The PSA donation list is in a binder in the library along with information about each organization. Community Service donated to InnVision and Peninsula Interfaith Action.

Concerns: The following concerns for the meeting came forward during our closing silence:

- The PYM Youth Program coordinator has given a report that has been circulated. Has she contacted our meeting? Can we encourage her to be in contact with our teens and youth?
- The nearly circular meeting room chair arrangements echo our sense of responsibility for our non-hierarchical organization.
- My motivation comes from the fellowship of working together, Team process is fun. Our connections multiply.
- We have to keep making the offer of inviting folks to join us. We are not arcane and closed. We can extend and accept invitations to community involvement.
- An Islamic friend will be visiting FDS.
- Finance committee is, by nature, conservative because it wants the long term survivability of the meeting. We can solicit support for projects we believe in.
