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Advices and Queries for Sixth Month: Social and Civic Responsibility

In the words of William Penn, "True godliness doesn't draw men out of the world, but enables them to live better in it and excites their endeavors to mend it." Elsewhere he commented: "It is a reproach to religion and government to suffer so much poverty and excess."

Poverty within a wealthy society is unjust, cruel, and often linked to skin color, gender, and language. We must examine our own privilege and role in the economic order that deepens this disparity. Friends should be alert to oppression and injustice, and persistent in working against them.

We value our part in shaping the laws of our country. Our task is to see that laws serve God's purposes and build a just social order. Our first allegiance should be to God, and if this conflicts with any compulsion of the state, we serve our country best by remaining true to our higher loyalty.

If, by divine leading, our attention is focused on a law that is contrary to God's law, we must proceed with care. Before acting, Friends should pray for further guidance and speak with the Meeting, family members, and all those who might be affected by the decision. If a decision involves disobedience to the law, we should make the grounds of our action clear to all concerned and be prepared to suffer any penalties without evasion. As a community, we must care for those who suffer for conscience's sake.

Adult Education Programs in June

Sunday, June 27, 12:50 in NMH, following lunch. Panel & Discussion: Environmental Action in Our Daily Activities. Unity with Nature Committee. Meeting members Steve Harris, Bob Chatfield, and Eric Sabelman have some special viewpoints into Earth issues. They will tell us about their professional and volunteer work relating to the environment, answer simple questions, and lead us in a more general discussion of how to relate our spiritual lives and environmental concerns to our daily lives.

Steve and Bob will begin by describing their daily work with strong connections to current environmental problems. Steve makes assessment of water flow and habitat preservation as CalTrans road construction forces choices every day. Bob is a research scientist in Earth Sciences at NASA who pulls together information sampled on the ground, on airplanes and drones, and from space by satellites. His work focuses on origins of air pollution, global climate change and related topics. Eric will talk about his work with EarthLight Magazine, as well as his considerable activity with Unity with Nature groups in PYM and FCNL. He knows many California Quakers who are active.

Report from Ad Hoc committee on the building use, part three –Friends Nursery School—Bart Burstein

The Ad Hoc Committee on Building Use has met twice on this; once in a joint meeting with the Director of Friends Nursery School. We have three charges, but have previously reported on two of them. The third – to refresh all our memories is "There has been some questioning of the use of the nursery school: how Quaker are they? How much a meeting ministry? Are the financial arrangements appropriate?"

Based on our understanding from one meeting with the Director, Annette Daniels, the Committee is united in the belief that Friends Nursery School is engaged in a mission consistent with Quaker Values. Although its governance is somewhat informally defined, it is based on a charge, instructional structure, and a mission in the community fully worthy of our continued support – in fact cooperation and partnership – from PAFM.

Similarly, we are united in the opinion that the current verbal history based agreement governing our inter-relationship has served both organizations well – and can continue to do so.

We did pose one question to Annette – asking if the establishment of a periodic contribution to a building reserve fund – would serve us both better in the future. Such a reserve could be held by FNS or PAFM. FNS will consider this request. In addition our conversation brought up some building maintenance and inter-organization communications enhancements – which have either been addressed or will be considered in the future by Buildings and Grounds Committee.

Will our informal agreement about cost sharing be recorded? The Clerk will look into it. Some of the information is in our “wiki.” We cost share on “middle major maintenance” projects while the FNS does minor maintenance and PAFM does major maintenance.

Report on Peninsula Interfaith Action Relationship

Diane Pasta read her report summarizing what PIA does and the questions before us regarding potential affiliation. Report attached. #3 Attach 5/9/10

One of the things that PIA could do is help us to unite and act on a concern as a Meeting—a commitment like Hotel de Zink or Harvest Festival which involves much (but not all) of Meeting. The methods PIA uses intentionally generate leadership. Are these our desires? [Discussion abridged below]

Concerns were expressed as to whether PIA would expect us to be geographically local when we are widely disbursed. This didn’t seem to be a problem. Mary Klein, the executive director of PIA and a member of our meeting expressed some reservations, perhaps preferring to separate her faith community from her work. , but she defers to the Meeting’s discernment.

The process is to have our community identify a concern deeply felt by many in the congregation and unify around a project related to that concern. This expectation seemed less of a fit with our individualistic tendencies and geographic diversity. Mary outlined some of the work that different congregations are doing. There are 19 PIA-like organizations working in California. It was clear that the kind of work being done is consistent with our testimonies, so that Community Service Committee has donated to PIA in the past two years even though we are not “members.”

There is an annual covenant and two levels of commitment, full and associate affiliation. We like the idea of hearing what other folks are doing and possibly joining in as individuals. Full membership might be a stretch for our nominating process. One member summed it up as “I hear people saying ‘I’d be happy to be part of a meeting where other people were doing this.’ If there isn’t a big enough commitment, it could be a guilt producing obligation.”

Since PIA seems to be doing the sorts of things Quakers traditionally do, we are drawn to the organization. Community Service Committee is the place where continued discussion will take place and a recommendation may come from them as to the level of affiliation, if any, we might want to undertake. You may also take your consideration of personal and corporate involvement directly to the clerk of meeting.

Peace and Social Action Committee: Carin Pacifico

Some requests for financial support are managed by PSA committee out of an annual allocation, but some requests for financial support need broader participation. The Haiti project has now organized itself as a 501c-3. Randy will be going down this summer and we’d like to send her with \$1,000 for the project including \$500 earmarked for house repair in Mon Bouton from the Meeting Special Needs fund. The request will be seasoned for a month.
